












10TH ANNUAL COCONINO COUNTY TEACHER OF THE YEAR

LEGISLATION

Incoming State Representative Matt Gress has introduced legislation to waive Arizona's Aggregate Expenditure Limit (AEL) for one-year, allowing schools to utilize resources already appropriated by the Arizona Legislature. The AEL was passed by voters in 1980, and requires legislative approval if K-12 spending exceeds a formula established in law. Because of record investments made by the Arizona Legislature and former Governor Doug Ducey, the cap has been triggered.

Instructional Coaching

The CCESA provides job-embedded coaching to teachers and leaders to improve the quality of learning for all students. Through coaching, the CCESA provides focused support to help teachers and administrators reach the goals they have set for students through the enactment of research-based best practices in teaching and leading. The CCESA coaching model is undergirded by three principles: building teacher trust, using a growth mindset, and calibrating coaches. CCESA coaches are trained in several coaching models such as Marzano's, Cognitive Coaching, and the Danielson Framework for Teaching.

<u>Universal Design for Learning (UDL)</u>

UDL, based on recent research in the learning sciences, provides a framework for understanding the differences among learners (learner variability) and plans for those differences by providing multiple means of engagement, multiple means of representation, and multiple means of action and expression. UDL is about building in flexibility that can be adjusted for every students' strengths and needs and by applying the UDL principles teachers can effectively instruct a diverse group of learners. Participants will not only learn about the UDL principles but they will also apply them to their own context. Continued on page 6/ Professional Development

Father Flannigan, founder of Boys Town, said, "When you you help a child today, YOU write the history of tomorrow." Our children are tomorrow's leaders, and teachers are the critical point that prepare children for the future.

As superintendent I spend a lot of time visiting schools in Coconino County and working with teachers. I am consistently amazed at the tireless and heroic work of teachers across the county. I see many teachers who deserve a standing ovation every day for the work they do and their impact on children.

Unfortunately, teachers do no always receive the recognition they deserve.

Recognition isn't just about feeling great.
Gallup research shows that teachers who receive recognition and praise are:

- More productive
- More engaged at work
- More likely to stay with their school
- More likely to receive higher satisfaction scores from students and parents

From a performance perspective, it's clear that when we fail to recognized our best teachers, we are leaving our schools' potential on the table.

To recognize our outstanding county teachers, The Coconino County Superintendent of Schools Office hosts an Annual Teacher of the Year and Rookie Teacher of the Year program. This program was created to celebrate, honor, and recognize exemplary professional educators. It does not attempt to select the "best" teacher; rather, to identify, from among many outstanding teachers of the year, one teacher to serve as a visible and vocal representative of what is the best in the profession. The program celebrates

excellence in teaching by recognizing teachers who have inspired a love of learning in their students and who have distinguished themselves in the profession.

Recognition is important.

Communities that provide a Teacher of the Year Program have found the program to have a positive impact on the entire community. Recognizing outstanding teachers: a) establishes a culture that rewards excellence in teaching; b) validates the work of teachers; c) provides teachers with a platform to speak about educational issues; d) gives students a sense of pride in their teachers; e) showcases teachers as positive role models; f) encourages students to think about teaching as a career; g) gives the community a sense of pride in its teachers; and h) helps to get the public involved and invested in the schools.

The teacher shortage in the nation's public schools, particularly in our high-poverty rural schools is a crisis for the teaching profession and a serious problem for the communities. It harms students and teachers and contributes to the opportunity and achievement gaps between students in high-poverty schools and their more affluent peers. Policy choices as well as policy inaction have contributed to the factors that have eroded the appeal of the teaching profession and it will take a comprehensive policy agenda to address those factors.

The Coconino County Teacher of the Year and Rookie Teacher of the Year programs are one of the ways that the Coconino County Superintendent of Schools office is working to support and celebrate educators in our community.

INNOVATION & DEVELOPMENT GRANTS

- The CCESA is also working directly with teachers and school administrators to meet the recent Science of Reading requirement in Arizona. Multiple cohorts of teachers and administrators are currently enrolled in ongoing professional development across the county. Meeting the needs of educators in face-to-face classes and online through virtual cohorts, the CCESA is able to make a large impact in the quality of reading instruction thanks to multiple grants supported by Coconino County, the Arizona Department of Education, and the American Rescue Plan. Teachers are invited to apply to the NEH Summer Landmarks of American History and Culture Racialized Spaces on Route 66 in July 2023, Flagstaff Arizona. Student Agency In Learning (SAIL)

Learn how to support the development of student agency through developing expertise and continuously attending to three interrelated constructs: formative assessment practice, classroom culture, and student identity.

The learning in this course consists of online course work, face-to-face sessions, Community of Practice meetings, and a video study group. As a part of the online work, participants will learn about the role of learning goals, success criteria, eliciting evidence of learning, peer feedback, and selfassessment in the formative assessment process. The face-to-face sessions will further explore these concepts while also looking at how to implement in the classroom. Participants will then be challenged to implement the new learning in their classroom and reflect upon the process during the Community of Practice. Participants will also participate in a video study group, analyzing their practice through the lens of selfassessment or peer feedback. It is required that participants register as a team from their site.

LETRS Volumes 1 & 2

LETRS, rooted in the science of reading, is designed to be the cornerstone of a multiyear, systemic literacy improvement initiative. Volume 1 (Units 1-4) addresses four critical outcomes for effective literacy instruction: understanding the science of reading, converting research to practice, enhancing teacher effectiveness, and transforming instruction. Volume 2 (Units 5-8) focuses specifically on oral language and vocabulary, understanding reading comprehension, text-driven comprehension instruction, and the reading-writing connection. By understanding the "why" behind science and evidence- based research, educators can effectively know how to aid students in learning to read. Coaching support will also be available for participating educators from Coconino County.

Introduction to Trauma-Informed Practices

Based on information compiled by the National Center on Safe Supportive Learning Environments, this training provides an introduction to school-based trauma-informed practices. Participants will learn about the prevalence of trauma in children and how trauma presents in student behavior. Additionally, this course will focus on classroom-based modifications and accommodations that prevent re-traumatization of students and instead build student resilience.

In addition to introducing the constitutionally required concurrent resolution needed to allow K-12 schools to spend dollars this year already appropriated by the Legislature, Gress supports passage of other transparency measures that allow parents and taxpayers to know where the money is going and what kids are learning. Over the last few years, the state added \$11 billion additional funding to K-12 education, increased per-pupil funding to all-time highs, and flipped a \$1 billion deficit into a projected \$2 billion surplus without raising taxes.

The Arizona Association of Counties (AACO) has also provided the following Legislative Update—Opening Day for the 56th Legislature was Monday, January 9th and Governor Katie Hobbs delivered her first State of the State address. Bill introduction has been slow, with a little over 500 bills introduced so far. The 7-bill limit on new bill introductions in the House kicked in on Thursday, January 12th. House members are now limited to 7 bills each. The deadline to request bills in the Senate was Tuesday, January 17th. The last day for Senate members to introduce bills was Monday, January 30th and the last day for House members to introduce bills is Monday, February 6th.

On January 31, 2023, HCR 2001, a Waiver for the Aggregate Expenditure Limit (AEL) was approved on an 8-1-1 vote in the House Education Committee with Rep. Diaz (D) being the lone no vote and Chair Pengarelli (R), who introduced the bill, voting present. Thanks to the bipartisan support for the bill, and for a very strong coalition of alphabet groups, including the Arizona Association of County Superintendents (AACSS) and to several speakers including among others, Rep. David Cook (R) and Blue Ridge Unified School District Superintendent Michael Wright. A companion bill introduced by Senate Education Chair Ken Bennett (R) should be heard the first full week of February 2023.
